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Pathfinder: Understanding and learning sign language

**Scope Note:** 

Sign language is a sequence of gestures used by deaf or hard of hearing people to

communicate. It developed in hard of hearing and deaf communities all around the

world, but due to the lack of communication between these communities in the

past, the differences between these sign languages were so great, that sometimes

they were mutually intelligible. However, the progress in technology brought many

other options and opportunities for deaf and hard of hearing people to

communicate in more universal ways and that lead to better understanding of the

nature of sign language as well.

Not only deaf or hard of hearing people learn sign language. Many hearing people

learn sign language because they have a loved one that is hard of hearing or deaf,

as well as because of personal interests, like becoming an interpreter for example.

People are often intimidated by learning sign language, but learning to sign is

much like learning a foreign language and it requires some of the same resources,

practice and a lot of patience.

This pathfinder focuses on the basics of sing language learning and some helpful

resources that will benefit the beginner in his/her journey in learning and

understanding the nature of sign language and how to sign.
